“Community and Connections” get started

The Strategic Plan presents a vision of a vital and nurturing community where we all can feel connected socially and spiritually. The Board identified this as one of our important focus areas for this year. Our goal was to form the Community and Connections Committee (CCC) by November.

After significant discussion at the September and October Board meetings we agreed that the charge to the CCC is:

The Community and Connections Committee’s charge is to assess how existing FUUSA councils, committees and events are promoting community and connections, to identify the gaps and to facilitate strategies to deepen and broaden the connections within our community and with our neighborhood.

This is a very broad mandate and we concluded that it made sense to form the committee with input from the whole congregation. We want your good ideas and support. Therefore, we divided the charge into four sub-areas to focus this discussion. In each sub-area a task force will be created.

One task force will survey current activities at FUUSA. Looking at a typical monthly calendar there are many activities that already address the Community and Connections Goal. The task force will spend time with the various committees and groups that are working on this now and determine what we do well and where the gaps are. This task force will be coordinated by the Program Coordinating Council.

The other three task forces will brainstorm ideas on what we should be doing and how it can be implemented. They will focus on three action areas:

Each task force will meet in November and December and then present their recommendations at the January Board meeting.

The Path of Compassion: Writings on Socially Engaged Buddhism by Kenneth Kraft. (1988) [294.337 EPP]

In a sense, this discussion among twenty-one teachers and practitioners in this excellent, inspiring, and entirely necessary anthology is moot, because at the deepest level Buddhist practice is inherently, ineluctably engaged in the world. The first half of the collection deals with thoughts on spiritual practice and social action. Are you interested in being a Service Leader?

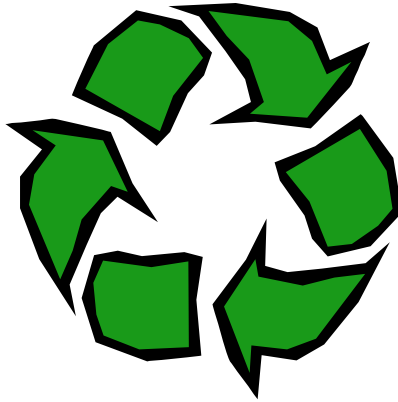

Green Sanctuary news

FUUSA is the first congregation in the area that is carbon neutral. ***"100% of FUUSA's electricity use will be matched with wind energy entering the electric grid from wind farms in NYS. Carbon offsets have been purchased to balance all of the direct greenhouse gas emissions from natural gas use for the church as well as 100% of emissions from church staff air and car travel and commuting. Member travel to and from weekly services and for church business have also been offset."*** Quote is from Community Energy. We have been able to do this through your generous purchases every Sunday for Fair Trade items and CFL bulbs. FUUSA members should be very proud of what has been accomplished, but it is just the first step in our commitment to being stewards of the earth. So let's continue what we have started.

Our second discussion will be on Sunday, November 21st in room B-8 at 11:45. Kathy Macri will be leading the discussion on Smart Water Use. Kathy is the Interagency Policy Coordinator at the NYS Environmental Facilities Corporation and in the Corporate Sustainability Office Executive Division. Come join us on this important topic.

The pledge that many of you signed back in 2006 is being revised and with new members joining our congregation, we will start a new pledge drive soon which we hope you will participate in. Now that we

are carbon neutral, we hope that you will renew your pledge to continue to reduce our carbon footprint for coming year.

Prepare meals for the shelter

The Overflow Homeless Shelter will open for the season at the First Lutheran Church (basement) on the first of November again this year and FUUSA will be preparing 2-3 meals a month until the end of April, sharing Mondays with the First Presbyterian Church. By the time you read this, we will have begun!

Usually, 2 or 3 FUUSAns prepare a nutritious yet economical meal for 25 in FUUSA's kitchen, on the second and fourth Monday afternoons from about 3:45 PM – 6:00 PM. There is a fifth Monday on November's calendar and we are responsible for it. We welcome anyone who is interested and free on Monday afternoons to sign up to help cook. If you are not free at that time, we are also looking for dessert providers who buy or cook at home. You will be reimbursed for the expense.

Jerry Deighan, Sue Ellen and Delainie Bart, or Barb Cooley will plan the meal and do the shopping ahead of time. Those signed up join us in the kitchen at 3:45 PM. We deliver the meal to the shelter about 6:15 PM (so you are free by 6:30 PM) It is also possible for your family/group to take over the entire Monday if you prefer - just check with Barb.

Cooking for the shelter is a great way to be involved in our inner-city church neighborhood while cooking with UU friends! If you are interested in helping with the cooking, please sign up in Channing for the date of your choice. If you would like to provide a dessert instead, sign up for that - bring dessert for 25 (cookies, bars or brownies) to FUUSA on Sunday (well marked for the shelter) or deliver it by 5:30 PM on Monday.

The current sign-up covers November – January;

we'll deal with February – April after the holidays. Whoever is in charge will remind you by phone or e-mail a few days prior.

**A second overflow homeless shelter!
Overnight volunteers needed**

For those of you who have wanted a more “hands-on” experience at a homeless shelter – this is for you!

Last winter, St. Peter's Church (107 State St.), along with individuals from Partners in Outreach, operated an overflow shelter to augment the ministry of the Capital City Rescue Mission. They will be opening for their second season on December 1 and they are looking for overnight volunteers from area churches.

The mission screens and selects 12-15 men from their population and brings them, along with a Mission Staff Resident Assistant, to St. Peter's after dinner, at 8 PM. They are looking for volunteers (1 or 2 – taking turns staying awake) to stay overnight and to act as an extra pair of hands assisting the Mission staff. They leave by 7 AM. Eight churches volunteered last year and they are hoping increase that number and include FUUSA this season. No regular commitment is required, just a night or two

per season. More is possible, of course! You can choose to become involved with the overnights or remain detached with a good book for much of the evening.

This year they are asking the volunteers to attend an orientation session run by the Mission but held at St. Peter's. One of these sessions remains: November 18 from 6 PM – 8 PM, but other will be added as needed. Barb Cooley and Lois Griffin are attending on the 18th and we would welcome more FUUSAns then or at a later date.

Additionally, St. Peter's Church is accepting donations for the running of the shelter to include monetary contributions, coffee, sugar, fruit juice, microwave popcorn, Danish/muffins, bread, peanut butter, fresh fruit, milk, and creamer. Donations will be accepted at St. Peter's, 107 State St., Albany 12207.
